This summer, we have an exciting slate of new programs and initiatives for creative ways to engage with the collection. Here are a few highlights of our upcoming events, partnerships, and exhibitions:

DEVELOPMENT + EVENTS

We were thrilled to host an Up Close event on June 1st, with behind-the-scenes access to the Museum's collection. This included the progress on the restoration of NIMBUS, a "flying machine" (sketch above) by Erie artists John Vahanian and David Seitzinger. It also marked the beginning of a Kickstarter campaign for its restoration and reinstallation. You can learn more about the process on page 12.

Painterly Polaroids, an exhibit of the hand-altered Polaroids and prints by Nicole Reinhold Martin, features large projections of her work.

Passionately Curious follows the creative journey of Tony Machi, a performance artist and documentarian. Beginning with his time as an Edinboro student in the late 60s, the exhibit incorporates his photographs, mixed media works, sculptures and short films.

Themes of nature and our interaction with it also rise to the surface in *Connecting with the Collection: Entre Plantas y Mujeres* featuring artist and guest curator, Ana Balcazar. For more on her study of the permanent collection and the paintings she is creating in response, see pages 9 and 10.

With a unique blend of hands-on art making and casual presentations in a beautiful setting, the Museum offers opportunities to talk with working artists about their process and inspiration. We look forward to your visit!

A Q&A with Ana Balcazar

As a regional art museum, we celebrate the generations of artists before us and their connection to the artists of our time. Our mission is to present ways to engage with these works and understand their meaning, explore their relevance to our community today, and consider how to shape this resource for the future. In an initiative to explore the Museum's collection, we are inviting artists, curators, and community members to put together exhibitions that involve the works we house, to present multiple perspectives on collecting art and how it represents our culture.

For the upcoming 2023 *Connecting with the Collection* exhibition, we invited Peruvian visual artist and educator **Ana Balcazar** to curate and create works in response to the Museum's collection. She will be in residence from late April through late July. Ana's stay is sponsored in part by Gannon University.

Tell us a bit about yourself and your background. What brought you to Erie, PA?

I studied in Peru for my Bachelor's in Art for eight years, and a Master in Arts Education for two. I have done lots of things, from movies and cultural management to art education, but my greatest passion is for painting. I started painting murals professionally in 2017 and that brought me great opportunities to travel and to be a full time artist.

The first time I was in Erie, PA was to visit family in 2011. I wanted to see the frozen lake but it was impossible to leave the house because of a great winter storm. I came back ten years later to visit again in May of 2021. They happened to have several large canvases at home for me to use, so I decided to start painting in the backyard of my new Erie studio and posted some of the work on my Instagram.

Later that year, I came back to Erie from Estonia to work on my first commission in the USA. That's when Erie Arts & Culture discovered me on a geotag from my post in May. Patrick Fisher, who was their executive director, introduced me to the art community. I then received two solo show offers. The first was at Erie Center for Arts & Technology, and then came *Botanicals* at 1020 Collective, both in 2022. I was then invited to paint my first mural in the USA for the Purposeful Placemaking program. All in all, 2022 was a great year. I also had my first solo show in Europe, titled *Amazon Baroque* in Tallinn, Estonia. Now I am back in Erie to work with the Museum's collection.

You've spent a lot of time exploring our collection, what particular things were you looking for?

I decided to explore the archives with an open mind. I wanted the collection to surprise me, so I did not have a specific idea of what I was looking for, but the enthusiasm of having such a valuable opportunity to see and work with these treasures. The collection is a broad sweep of generations, subjects, styles, and mediums. I really enjoyed spending all those hours in the obsessive activity of going through piece by piece, reading the tags, imagining the past, and immersing myself in each artist's world.

I found many botanical compositions, but when I was getting deeper into the archive, I noticed there were a lot of portraits of women, and I became interested in how these women were depicted, why they were painted or photographed, who they were, what the artist was trying to say through these female bodies, personalities, characteristics and scenarios. I also noticed the lack of represented minorities, and I am hopeful to find a way to balance this in the exhibition.

What connections are you finding between botanical representation and female representation in art?

To say I am finding connections in art is too broad. I can talk about the specific curatorship of my selections, but even more than just finding the connections, I like to think I am creating them and complementing the work from past artists.

There were images that I could not get out of my mind, like artistic white women nudes, young white girls in nature, portraits of older women and very intriguing compositions that imagine less

idealized and even confrontative ways of femininity or women's representation. I started connecting things by color, subject, composition, and meaning. I found a link between these women's representations and botanicals. I had to make my decision. I narrowed the 8,000 pieces down to 200, and then to 40. I had finally found my subject: *Between Plants and Women*.


One of the goals of the digitization efforts at the Erie Art Museum is to increase accessibility to the collection, and one of the prime examples of this is our efforts conducted in 3D modeling the *Avalon Restaurant*, a popular, historical sculptural piece created by Lisa Lichtenfels in 1981-1982. While investigating needed repairs to the Customs House, where the *Avalon Restaurant* resided for decades, Museum staff removed the piece to complete repairs to the space and to execute needed restoration and cleaning of the artwork. Before doing so, a 3D model was created using Photogrammetry, which is a 3D modeling technique consisting of hundreds of 2D photos of a subject combined to create a textured & colored 3D object.

Thanks to RealityCapture, the software used to scan the *Avalon*, this technology not only allows the Museum to preserve our collection in a digital format, but it also provides visitors with an immersive and interactive experience, allowing them to view the artwork from all angles and appreciate the details in a way that was previously impossible.

In 1979, NIMBUS was chosen to be displayed at former governor Richard Thornburgh's inaugural festivities at the William Penn Memorial Museum in Harrisburg. The motorized sculpture was also exhibited at the Erie Art Center in 1979, and in 2012, it found its forever home as part of the Museum's permanent collection.

John Vahanian has made a name for himself as a glass worker and expressionist painter, while David Seitzinger is a retired commercial artist, inventor, and toy designer. Both artists have been working hard at restoring the "flying machine" in the basement of the Customs House so that Museum visitors can enjoy it again.

Expect to see the hanging sculpture in all its glory soon.
